# A Happy Goodbye to 2020

I am sure, most or all of us would say a happy goodbye to 2020, given the hardships and even deaths of loved ones we experienced.

From a LuLu membership standpoint, the year was not too bad. Let me just review how membership faired through the pandemic. We must always keep in mind, that every membership number is not just a number, but represents one of our friends at LuLu.

We started out in 2020 with 1,047 members. By the end of 2020, we had 1,006 members. So, why the decline? We had 16 new Shriners join LuLu, 8 former members were restored, 45 members were lost to the Black Camel, 20 members were suspended for not paying their dues.

Why am I boring you with these numbers? We need your help. The 45 members taken by the Black Camel, is about average for LuLu over recent years. We need your help with bringing in new members, encouraging former members to come back, and keep the members we now have.

During 2020, under the leadership of Ill Sir Edward D. Blum, P.P. our Divan, Membership Committee and the leadership of the Clubs and Units worked diligently to provide reasons for our membership to remain loyal to LuLu.

To keep in touch with our members during this trying time of Covid, our Potentate organized a telephone squad comprising the Divan, Past Potentates, and the Membership Committee, to call every one of our members. We were inquiring of their wellbeing and if they needed any help we could provide. We all received heart felt, positive responses, from all we were able to contact.

To stem the tide of suspensions, our Potentate, with the assistance of our Membership Committee, sent letters in January, May, and October, to members who were in jeopardy of losing their Shrine membership. This was followed up by phone calls to members that had not responded. As a result of this effort, suspensions resulting from nonpayment of dues were 20 in 2020. We would like the number to be zero.

Creation of new Shriners is especially important for the growth and survival of LuLu. Early in 2020, when we had no Covid restrictions, the Divan, with stage assistants, created 16 new LuLu Shriners at a LuLu Ceremonial. This was a great achievement, since the Ceremonial Team was then reborn, for the future when we can all get together in the Auditorium, in person, for future Ceremonials.

In 2021, the membership incentive program provides that all who participate by bringing in new members can win. Not just one winner, but many winners. This was spelled out in our January 2021, Fez and can be found on our website www.lulushriners.org as "What's Your Number".

The life blood of LuLu is its members. As the sky clears, and the sun shines on a new year, in 2021, we look forward to you helping your LuLu Nobles have our membership grow.

# LuLu Shepherds Unit

We are (at present) 13 qualified Noble drivers who are tasked with transporting 'our children' from

locations within LuLu's Oasis to Shriners Hospital Philadelphia for their scheduled appointments, maybe to and from a local hotel or even Philadelphia International Airport and then back home again. We are also 14 other Nobles and Ladies who act as 2nd seaters or 'shotgun', as all transports MUST have two qualified persons; at least one being a Shriner. LuLu's Oasis includes Philadelphia, Delaware, Montgomery, Bucks, Chester, and

Our van is a Mercedes Benz 'Sprinter' vehicle that has been modified with a wheelchair lift to transport wheelchair bound or ambulatory children. In December 2020 we logged 28 transportations with almost 200 man/hours of volunteer time. For January 2021, we also logged 28 runs but volunteer man/hours increased to almost 250. I might add, we are trying to raise funds to purchase a 2nd vehicle as our patient transportation load has increased; we sometime have multiple transports in one day.




Our good and welfare chairman, Noble Hugh McGinniss,

Luckily in 2021 we have new leadership that is committed to growing our club and its reach. Newly elected president Noble Arthur Binder has an interesting and energetic program scheduled. # **Greetings from the Mounted Guard**

Covid-19 or not, our horses do not care. While it is true that we have not had them in parades or exhibitions, they still require the same care regardless of lockdowns and limitations. LuLu's Mounted is fortunate to have Ill. Sir William Morwald, P.P. as a member and for that matter, so is our entire Shrine.

As for our unit, four of our horses are boarded at Bill's farm. Add Bill's two and you have six horses stabled together. This is both a blessing for us and sometimes a curse for Billy. Most folks may not r ealize that horses require quite a bit of care. Every day starts the same at the farm with Bill going out to grain the horses. While they are enjoying breakfast, he goes out to the field and loads their hay bales, checks on the water troughs, then returns to the barn. The critters all get a treat or two before they are turned out in the field for the day.

That is when the work really starts. All six stalls need to get mucked (that means shoveled out) then new shavings laid down. Each water bucket needs to be emptied, brushed clean, rinsed, and refilled with fresh water. Every stall gets two laps of hay except for Liberty who only gets one, and then the barn is swept. It is now ready for when the horses return to their stalls for more grain at supper time and spend the night.

The process repeats every day. There is no holiday or vacation save when we take them to Fall MASA or Imperial and then the work is spread out among all our riders. The only real change in the schedule occurs every six weeks when our farrier arrives to reset or replace their shoes.



### COVID-19 VIRUS - PART III

COVID-19 Not Under Control – The impact of the virus is still affecting the way we conduct business and gather socially. To date, there have been approximately 25,615,268 reported cases in the US and 431,619 deaths attributed to the virus. California, Texas, Florida and New York have reported the most cases (3.3, 2.35, 1.7 and 1.4 million, respectively). Pennsylvania currently has the eighth most reported cases with 840,000.

Keeping up with the tradition of brotherhood, social interaction, good-spirited fun and providing care for children and families in need, has been difficult, not just within our organization, but all professional and social groups nationwide. Companies scurried to find a vaccine that will curtail the spread of this deadly virus. On December 11, 2020, the United States Food and Drug Administration (FDA) granted an Emergency Use Authorization (EUA) for the Pfizer-BioNTech COVID 19 vaccine.

To date, approximately 27.9 million vaccines have been administered. The School District of Philadelphia has transitioned from 100% digital learning to slowly introduce a mix of in-person and digital learning (i.e. hybrid learning). Pennsylvania business have suffered as well due to COVID restrictions. Though business can reopen, telework must continue unless impossible and all in-person businesses may operate at 75% occupancy (with some restrictions according to the Department of Health's event occupancy calculator) and following all worker and building and safety requirements for employers.

**November 10th, 2020** – LuLu Shrine Building Restriction implemented. No live events to be held inside or outside the Shrine until November 17, 2020. Building sanitized.



### It's the Law

Prior to the 16th century, folks in Germany and the surrounding area were fermenting all kinds of nonsense and calling it "beer." Since there were no big commercial breweries that shipped beer far and wide, people were stuck with whatever was made in their local town. In 1516, Germany adopted Der Reinheitsgebot, literally, "The Purity Order." OK, I know, that sounds absolutely terrifying. But all it said was that beer could only be made from the three following ingredients: water, barley, and hops. It was eventually amended to include a fourth ingredient: yeast.

Then everything was swell for hundreds of years of brewing and the Germans firmly established themselves as the masters of beer making. Many terms used in the brewing process to this day are German in origin.

Then things changed in the late 1980's, early 90's. There was a lot of legal wrangling from importers that wanted to sell their non-compliant beers in Germany. Domestic German brewers felt their hands were tied due to the legal restrictions and feared importers were going to take their market share. America had started opening microbreweries like crazy and German consumers wanted more diverse brews. They couldn't be one-upped by the Americans. Der Reinheitsgebot got blown away. A few years later





after the regulations were cancelled, an updated version, Vorläufiges Biergesetz (the less-scary sounding, "Provisional Beer Law"), which was not quite so draconian, was passed in 1993. So, the insanely strict beer laws stood for nearly half a millennia!

Sometimes the government does the will of the people and sometimes the people go nutty and take matters into their own hands. In 1842, folks living around Prague (in what's currently the Czech Republic) were pretty unhappy with the lousy local beer. How unhappy were they? Well, they were so unhappy, that they stormed the local brewery and smashed the casks, Elliot Ness-style, and demanded better quality beer. The brewers, who were probably fearing for their lives, quickly went to work crafting a tasty new brew. Thus, the town of Plzen opened the Pilsner Urquell ("Pilsner from the original source") brewery soon after, which is still cranking out their spicy, straw-colored beer to this day. And this style has been knocked-off by every major manufacturer and is the most popular style of beer in the US (most American light beers are technically Pilsners, like Budweiser, Coors, and Miller).

So, in addition to health regulations, pasteurization requirements, age limits, and restrictions on when/ where alcohol may be sold, folks have come up with clever ways to make it more complicated to sell booze. One may make beer at home in Pennsylvania for personal consumption, not for sale, but no more than 300 gallons annually. If someone can actually produce and consume 300 gallons of beer in a year, I'd tip my fez to them. And I would also give them a phone number to get some help. Let's be reasonable, yeah?

But you, dear reader, do not have to go through all that effort. Pennsylvania has about 350 microbreweries, not to mention multiple distilleries and wineries. And the Lu Lu Shriners Brewmeisters are looking to visit as many as possible. We're starting a Taproom, which is becoming popular across Shrinedom. It's just a social club for mirth, merriment, and fellowship where we visit various locations and taste what they have to offer. Ladies are welcomed.
