

COVID-19 VIRUS - PART IV

COVID-19 Vaccines have been ramping up – At the time of this article, the United States has administered approximately 150 million doses and approximately 55 million citizens are now fully vaccinated (which is around 17% of the population).

Worldwide, approximately 597 million doses have been administered and 130 million people are now fully vaccinated (just under 2% of the population).

Currently, the three vaccines that are authorized and recommended to prevent COVID-19 are 1) Pfizer-BioNTech 2) Moderna and 3) Johnson & Johnson /Janssen. As of February 27, 2021, there are two large-scale COVID-19 clinical trials that are in progress: 1) AstraZeneca and 2) Novavax. The CDC recommends you get a COVID-19 vaccine as soon as you are eligible.

If you are a Veteran, Congress passed a new law that allows the VA to offer COVID-19 vaccines to more Veterans and some spouse and caregivers of Veterans. The VA's Veterans Health Administration is the largest integrated health care network in the US with 1,255 health care facilities serving 9 million enrolled Veterans each year.

Coronavirus cases are rising in and around

Philadelphia. To date there are 1,024,857 total cases (+4,557 from day before) and 25,093 total deaths (+44 from the day before). *Totals as of March 31, 2021.


February 2nd, 2021 – The CDC announced guidelines that required masks on planes, busses, trains, and other forms of public transportation traveling into, within, or out of the US.



Skunky Beer

One of the key ingredients in beer are hops. Hops are a vining plant (I'm told raw hops are poisonous to dogs, FYI) with green, pine cone-shaped flowers. Hops were put into beer thousands of years ago primarily for their preservative properties, but they also impart a bitter taste and aromatic smell. They impact the flavor/smell, more or less, depending on the type of hop and technique used. The beer style IPA, or India Pale Ale, is an extremely bitter, hoppy beer. The British were shipping beer to their colonies in India and had to ensure it would survive the long sea voyage. Thus, they jacked up the beer with a heck of a lot of hops to preserve it. That's how we got ultra-hoppy India Pale Ale. It was simply out of practicality.

In modern brewing, we don't really need hops for their preservative properties since we know about pasteurization and refrigeration. Rather, we want hops for the aromatic and/or flavoring properties. Every strain of hops (and there are many) have their own profile; some more bitter and some more aromatic, with a variety of profiles. And their effectiveness depends on which stage of the brewing process they are introduced to the beer.

Each strain of hops has an IBU (International Bitterness Unit) rating. This rates the bitterness of the hops as a percentage of alpha acids to overall weight. The alpha acids in hops are what one is really looking to extract for either flavor or aroma. So, for example, if one is going to brew a really bitter IPA, one may toss in a lot of high IBU hops early in the process. If one is making a sweet, dark ale, one may toss low IBU hops in later in the process.





But I was talking about skunky beer. Beer gets skunky when the alpha acids in hops interact with sunlight. One very common type of alpha acid in hops, called isohumulone, is particularly reactive to sunlight (ultraviolet, or UV). When hit with UV light, isohumulone produces riboflavin, which smells and tastes like a latrine. Since this alpha acid is so common in most hops, that's why beer is normally bottled in brown, blue, or green glass (or cans/kegs). The colored glass (or aluminum) blocks the UV light and allows the brewers to stop it from interacting with their beer.

Corona, famously, is packaged in clear bottles. They do this intentionally for marketing purposes, of course. The hops they use do not contain isohumulone, so they don't have to worry about their beer going skunky in the sun. Pretty clever given their beach-centric marketing, 'eh?

Within the last several years, Samuel Adams started packaging their six packs in very tall cardboard holders. Other manufacturers have followed suit. This is designed to shield sun exposure in addition to their use of brown bottles.

If I can't get draft beer, then I'd rather have it canned over bottled. Metal is a conductor while glass is an insulator. That doesn't just go for electricity, it's for any form of energy (including heat). So there's zero risk of sun exposure to canned beer and it chills very quickly. Some folks think cans impart a metallic taste to the beer, but I never noticed that.

We're starting a Taproom; which is becoming popular across Shrinedom. It's just a social club for mirth, merriment, fellowship, and frivolity where we visit various locations and taste what they have to offer. Ladies are welcomed. 


