Investment Advisory Committee

Almost everyone has heard of the IAC (Investment Advisory Committee), but perhaps not everyone is aware of what its purpose and duties are.

The Investment Advisory Committee (IAC) is one of LuLu's most essential elements. Its responsibility and obligation is to manage, preserve and grow LuLu's monetary assets to assure that there are adequate funds available to meet LuLu's current needs and to assure its future. The IAC must manage the monetary assets so that it can provide the funds necessary to allow LuLu to conduct its planned activities and to expand, maintain and improve its physical property and other assets. IAC members have an education and experience in corporate finance management. To achieve their responsibility the IAC must have a level of continuity and consistency; it is necessary to prevent emotional reactions and short-term speculation. To accomplish this, the IAC works closely with an Investment Advisor (frequently also a member of the Shrine) to manage the investment of the available capital.

The IAC consists of 5 elected (at-large) members plus the Potentate, Chief Rabban, Treasurer, and Recorder. The elected members of the committee are elected for a five-year term, equal in time served to that of the Divan and longer than any other operative group or committee within the Shrine. Each year, the term of one of the elected members expires. Having completed the first term, the member is eligible to be elected to

a second 5-year term. Following the completion of a second term, the member must take a year off; he is then eligible to run for another 5-year term.

During the past decade, LuLu's financial world changed dramatically. These changes created extremely difficult financial challenges. The historic fund-raising activities: Circus, Rodeo, Haunted House, and other lesser events, all phased out. LuLu's income dwindled dramatically. As a result of the monetary collapse, the assets under the control of the IAC were depleted and LuLu's very existence was in jeopardy. To survive, the membership decided that we should sell approximately one-half of our property. In the years following the sale, LuLu's financial status has changed dramatically.

The funds from the sale, after all expenses were paid, were placed in a dedicated account, named the "Land Fund", with the provision that the principal may not be withdrawn; but, if an opportunity occurs, funds may be added to the principal. The income from the fund is used to finance and support LuLu's programs and activities

The IAC is an integral part of LuLu's successful activities and its future.



Hospital Rounds



Happy New Year to one and all! I hope everyone has a very healthy and happy 2023. Many people set goals for the New Year, mine always seem to include losing weight, but that's a conversation for another time.

For the Hospital Board of Governors, our expectations are high for the new 2023 incoming and current returning Board of Governors members. Our Board of Governors selection process never ends, as we are already preparing the interview process for the 2024 candidates.

Below is a synopsis of points taken from Article 5 section 105.1.

In January of each year, the Chairman of the Board of Governors shall contact in writing, the Potentate of each Shrine Temple that sponsors the Hospital (with copies to the Recorder of each such Shrine Temple and all members of the Board of Governors), soliciting nominations for all anticipated vacancies which occur on the Board of Governors at the end of that calendar year. The Recorder of each Shrine Temple shall promptly distribute/publicize this information to Temple Membership in the Temple newsletter and any other applicable application requesting nominations for anticipated vacancies on the Hospital Board of Governors. This letter will specify the requirements and professional skills or experience necessary or desired for selection as a Board of Governors member and will enclose a copy of the job description for



8710 Crispin St Phila. PA 19136 (215) 742-2105 FAX (215) 335-1001 Board of Governors approved by the Board of Trustees. All nominations accompanied by the required application form are to be submitted to the Nominating Committee of the Board of Governors no later than May 1 of that year.

The Board of Governors shall evaluate all nominees to determine those who meet the qualifications of the membership skills list and select from those individuals whose skills and experience will satisfy the current and/or anticipated requirements of the Board of Governors. The Nobles selected by the Nominating Committee of the Board of Governors shall be asked to participate in an in-person interview which will be conducted by the Nominating Committee at the hospital.

Together, the nominees shall offer to the Board of Governors diverse talents, abilities and points of view derived from varied business and professional backgrounds. Such backgrounds include one or more attorneys, accountants, bankers, insurance agents and commercial builders or contractors.

Serving on the hospital Board of Governors, in my opinion, is a great honor and a very humbling experience. Lulu is looking for a few good men to keep our proud tradition going strong. At one time, we had three full Board members and one Associate member. Unfortunately, no Lulu Shrine member applied for a 2023 Board position, which left Lulu with only one full Board member and no Associate Board member. I would also like to clarify a point; the selection process chooses from the best qualified candidates and selection isn't specific to the Temple. Please review Article #5 thoroughly. There is one thing I am certain of, there are numerous highly qualified nobles among our ranks. I can assure you will find it to be very rewarding.



cases, lodging for families whose kids are being treated at our Philadelphia hospital. As you might expect, it is rather costly to provide this amazing service. What you might not know is that we cannot directly solicit for funding. Since this falls under "charitable fundraising" there are rules that must be followed to not jeopardize our 501 (c) (3) standing. That is not to say that people cannot voluntarily make bequests to our transportation fund, rather, we can't ask for them. However, if we hold a charity fundraiser, we are allowed to request a percentage remain with the transportation fund.

Our predecessors found another option to help fund the transportation fund into perpetuity. They developed the Tree of Life. We have all seen the tree on the wall in the Great Room with all the bronze leaves and stones and probably didn't know much about it.

Well, one can purchase a leaf (\$150), a small stone (\$300), or a large stone (\$500) and have it engraved in memory of or in honor of some person or group. The funds are turned over to our Trustees and placed into our "Tree of Life" fund where the income is annually returned to our transportation fund account for use. I am optimistic that this knowledge will spike an increase in tree purchases and perhaps even some outright bequests.

Anyway, I would also like to congratulate the other officers (elected and appointed) to important positions at LuLu. We should all welcome Noble Joel C. Wolfert (and his lady Barbara) as our Oriental Guide and thank them for the commitment.

Finally, remember, next time you're at the Shrine, my door is always open.
